THE TIME FOR HOLDING ELECTIONS.

The propriety of holding the State and National elections in this State on the same day is being strongly urged by many intelligent persons. There is no good reason why both elections should not be held in November in Pennsylvania, as well as in New York, New Jersey, California, and other States.

Besides, by holding both elections on the same day in all the adjoining States, the practice of "colonizing" would be greatly checked, as every man would be required to vote in his own district.

We hope to see a speedy change made in this particular, and we hope our brethren of the press, without distinction of party, will assist us in urging the matter upon the attention of our State Legislature.

Of course this change would not affect local elections, which are of an entirely distinct nature, as they should be for many reasons; but where great States are jointly interested, as in the elections of State officers and Congressmen, which have a certain bearing upon national interests, it is proper that the choice should be made on the same day.

THE WARD DIVISIONS. The wards in the city of Reading should be divided into precincts as soon as possible, for the accommodation of voters of all parties.

For instance, in the Second Ward the total vote polled on Tuesday was 939. Suppose the Radicals in the Legislature should pass a law (as they probably will) opening the polls at 8 a. m. and closing them at 6 p. m.

In the other Wards the vote is not so heavy, but it will not be long before the number of voters in a majority of the Wards will average 1000, who will have to vote at the rate of 100 an hour in case of the passage of such a registry law as was under discussion at the last session of the Legislature.

As in the case of changing the time of holding our State election, we request our brethren of the press in this city to aid us in urging the division of the Wards into election precincts, for the accommodation of citizens of all parties.
