

NEWS FROM

—On September 10th William V. Porter, of Roxbury, Maine, killed a bear at noon; he set a trap and at five o'clock the same day took from it a cub; September 21 he took from his trap another bear; September 29 another, and on the 9th of October another, making four old bears and one cub which he trapped and killed in less than one month.

—Alrec, the gymnast, had a bad fall in the city of Mexico. He was hanging by one foot, when he had a rush of blood to the head and tumbled on the netting. Jumping up, he clambered again up the rope, only to lose his grasp of the rig, and fell this time to the floor, sixty feet.

—A man in Trumbull county, Ohio, last week, deposited \$600 in greenbacks in his parlor stove for safe keeping, informing his wife of what he had done. Next day she had company, forgot about the money, lighted a fire in the stove, and \$300 of the government debt was paid.

—Among the animal curiosities at the Maine State Fair was an enormous grey Clydesdale stallion, lately purchased in Canada. He weighed nearly 2,800 pounds, and his fore shoes weighed seven pounds each. A horse weighing 1000 pounds is of good size.

—An England shipmaster and mate are on trial for setting off on the ice, twelve miles from the shore of Newfoundland, six stow-away boys, who were found concealed in their vessel on an Atlantic voyage. Two of the boys, eleven years old only, died before reaching land.

—In one of the hydraulic mines in California, a stream of water struck a man, named Edward Tyler, threw him down and broke his neck. His body, below the neck, was completely paralyzed at once, but the head lived for three days, and felt as well as ever.

—The English forces stationed at present in the Dominion of Canada consist of 12,500 men, constituted as follows: Eight regiments and two battalions of infantry, one regiment of rifles, seventeen batteries of artillery and three companies of engineers.

—A married man in Constantinople had a difficulty with five of his wives, which he settled by tying them up in sacks and throwing them into the Bosphorus. His thirty-eight other wives have given him no trouble since the bit of house-cleaning came off.

—The construction of three lines of railways, traversing Greece in three different directions, has just been conceded to a Belgian company. The work is to be immediately commenced. The railway to the Piræus is now nearly completed.

—A writer in the Louisville Medical Journal, who has examined the case of the Blomquist Twins, says they can be separated, without any danger, and that the severance should have been made long ago.

—The Bank of North Carolina has become bankrupt, owing, it is said, to the operations of some New York creditors, who demanded par value for notes of the bank bought at a discount since the close of the war.

—Several families who have spent the summer at Dunbarton, New Hampshire, remained to admire the woods in autumn, and on Saturday last took a sleigh ride and had a merry time.

—Ex-Gov. J. M. Wells, of Louisiana, who was removed by order of Gen. Sheridan, has brought suit for the recovery of the salary accruing during the term for which he was chosen.

—A scarecrow has been invented down East of so hideous a character that the crows in the neighborhood are busily engaged in bringing back the corn they stole last summer.

—The last "feature" of a New York fashionable wedding is for the organist to play a low accompaniment to the words which the minister utters in performing the ceremony.

—The tomb of the late Governor Allen, of Louisiana, in New Orleans, is so covered with flowers placed there every morning by the ladies as to be almost concealed.

—The Boston Post says that "Secretary Seward's marriage is said to have been prevented by the remonstrances of his family against his ringing that little bell."

—James Stewart, a well known negro preacher, was shot dead recently in Quitman county, Ga., by a negro watchman, while the preacher was stealing corn.

—Six large bears were seen in one day last week in Lackawanna township, Luzerne county. There is great excitement on the bear question thereabouts.

—The Australian colonies have 600,000 horses, 4,000,000 cattle, 38,500,000 sheep, 4,000,000 pigs and 2,500,000 acres of cultivated land.
