THE ASSASSINATION SCHEME.

The next move on the political chess-board of the Radicals, will probably be a bogus attempt to assassinate Gen. Grant.

This attempt may be only a farce, but it may possibly be a serious affair for Grant himself.

Lisbon, Nov. 7.—An account has just been received here, announcing the almost complete annihilation of the Portuguese in Mozambique, South Africa.

For the past few days, the Radical journals have been boasting of a decrease of the national debt during the month of October.

This morning the journals printed the October statement of the debt. On the face it would appear that the debt had been reduced \$7,614,166 13, the sum total being \$2,627,129,562 82.

Foreign News.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 7.—Information has been received here stating that the bark Kate Darton, Captain Slocum, of St. Johns, New Brunswick, from Liverpool for Bombay, was burned at sea on September 28.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—The ex-Queen of Spain and suite have arrived here.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 7.—The Madrid correspondent of the Independence Belge writes to that journal that the Provisional Government of Spain will entertain no proposals from the United States looking to the purchase of Cuba.

MADRID, Nov. 7.—On the advice of the Generals of the army, the Provisional Government will immediately despatch a force of 9000 men, with four batteries of artillery, to Cuba, to suppress the insurrection there.

MADRID, Nov. 8.—Marshal Serrano has confirmed the appointment of General Prim as Commander-in-Chief of the Armies of Spain.

MADRID, Nov. 8.—At a meeting of republicans in that city yesterday, it was decided that the party should vote against a monarchy at the coming election.

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GRANT'S "PEACE" is being illustrated in Florida. The Governor, Reed, refuses to recognize his impeachment by the Legislature of that State, and declares it an illegal body.

A WHALING SETTLEMENT established three a half years ago at Exeter Sound, in Davis' Straits, North America, has proved unsuccessful.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

TUESDAY, Nov. 10.—An Arkansas despatch says trouble is feared in that State, and the Governor has ordered the raising of a large militia force.

A tidal wave in the island of Hawaii destroyed a number of houses and caused considerable loss. The Board of Health have ordered the vaccination of the whole population of Honolulu.

The Bentley Springs Hotel and cottages, in Baltimore county, Md., were burned on Saturday. Loss \$40,000.

The emigrant steamer Palmerston, from Hamburg for New York, has put back to Plymouth, leaking.

The Tennessee Legislature met yesterday but had no quorum.

The Governor of Georgia has issued a proclamation offering \$5000 reward for the arrest and conviction of those who killed Sheriff Ruffin, at Augusta, on election day.

It is announced from Washington that Secretary McCulloch may make an additional issue of 3 per cents.

An earthquake shock occurred at Victoria, Vancouver's Island, on November 4. Frequent earthquakes have occurred in the Sandwich Islands, and a sea wave has destroyed considerable property at Hawaii.

An insurrection has occurred at Hawaii, in the Sandwich Islands, growing out of an attempt of the Sheriff to arrest a "prophet" who predicted the end of the world.

There was a great popular demonstration in Cork, Ireland, Sunday, on the occasion of the funeral of James Mountain, who is supposed to have held a prominent position in the Fenian organization.

A number of wrecked Japanese were rescued from St. Peter's Island by the whale ship Rotch. They had been on the island eighteen months, living on birds' eggs and fish.

The rebellion in Cuba continues. The country is ravaged by robbers, under the name of revolutionists.

Advices from Paraguay state that the allied fleet is before Asuncion, and the allies hope for the surrender of the city.

The store of the Working Men's Co-operative Society, in Halifax, England, is a handsome stone building, erected at a cost of \$100,000.

A HISTORY of the slave trade carried on with the port of Charleston from 1804 to 1808, taken from the Custom-house records, has recently been published.
