AFTER THE BATTLE.

After the battle, when the smoke and confusion of the conflict have passed away, is the time chosen by a victorious and properly disciplined army to succor the wounded, bury the dead, and, while resting for a brief 'space from the toils of the contest, to reorganize its shattered ranks, and prepare cither to follow up the vanquished enemy, or to take other measures to secure the results of the victory.

With an army of greedy and selfish mercenaries, who fight only for plunder and personal profit, after the battle is the time for pillage, riot and general disorder, and it frequently happens that a lately victorious host has been surprised and totally routed by an inferior force of their better disciplined foes, while quarreling over the spoils of a victory.

· Such is the case with the Radical party at present. No sooner is the Presidential contest over than they engage in a selfish struggle for the spoils of their hardly won victory. The aspirants for this position are legion-every one thinking himself the very man to honor the place. and overy one sure of obtaining it but for one obstacle. That obstacle is the money-bag of Simon Cameron, who is already accused, by his fellow-Radicals, of having bought votes enough to secure the election of his particular favorite, who is not positively known.

The leading contestants in this race for a doubtful honor are Glenni W. Schofield, J. K. Moorhead, Wm. H. Kemble, Galusha A. Grow, Andrew G. Curtin, Thomas M. Marshall, Secretary Jordan, and Governor Geary. Of these, Kemble and Geary have already declined the honor-probably in the hope of having it "forced" upon them. Kemble appeared to have the inside track, at the start, and his withdrawal surprised his friends. The Curtin and Cameron factions are quarreling bitterly in secret, and in the meantime Thomas M. Marshall, of Allegheny, is in a fair way of snatching the hone while the other two are snarling over it-provided, always, that "Simon says thumbs up"-for, alas, for all concerned, the great Winnebago chief has dug up the hatchet, and which way it will be turned is unknown. War Department Order. The following order from the War Depart nent is published:

"The Attorney General of the United States, having given his official opinion that of a court martial, or a court of inquiry, by the twenty-fifth section of the act approved March 3, 1863, to issue the like process to compel the attendance of witnesses before such military court as is issued by the local courts of criminal jurisdiction, includes also the power to execute such process through some officer who shall be especially charged with its execution. It is ordered that judge advocates of military courts, who may hereafter issue such process to compel the attendance as witnesses of persons not in the military service, formally direct the same by name to some military officer, who shall be designated by department commander as available for the purpose, and the nearest military commander will thereupon furnish a sufficient force for the execution of the process whenever such force shall be actually required. It will be noted, however, that whereas a process of attachment can only be enforced as herein directed, the preliminary summons or subpæna may be served by any person whatever."

The Coban Insurrection.

The provisional government of Spain has conferred on Count Balmaseda the full power to pardon all persons engaged in the present insurrections except the leaders. The rebels are in possession of Remate. Mata, and some other towns in the jurisdiction of Puerto Principe. Remate is on the southern slope of the island, about forty and about ten miles inland. There is much fighting in the whole neighborhood. A rebel commission in Havana claim that they have plenty of money in New York as wel as war material. They also claim for the rebels the rights of belligerents. Many Moxicans are arriving and their movements are watched.
