From South America.

LASHON, Nov. 13.—The regular mail steamer from Rio Janeiro arrived here today with later news from the seat of war.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Rio Janeiro advices to October 24th have been received. The news from Paraguay is to the effect that the allies have reconnoitred the position held by Lopez, and that it is thought to be unassailable.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The South American mails bring the following intelligence from Paraguayan sources: A battle took place on Sept. 24th, at Villeta, where Lopez was strongly entrenched with all his troops.

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The Pacific Railroad. Edron Road.—The Union road, so-called, appears to be the greatest swindle ever perpetrated in this age of sharp practices.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY

MONDAY, Nov. 16.—North Carolina gives a majority of 12,000 for General Grant. In the Seventh Congressional District, heretofore claimed by the Democrats, Jones, Republican, is reported to have 200 majority.

There was a splendid display of meteors on Friday night and Saturday morning, which was visible throughout the United States. It was also seen in England.

A collision occurred between two ferry boats in a slip at New York, on Saturday, by which two persons were killed and a number injured.

The official vote of Delaware is for Seymour, 10,953; Grant, 7,633. Seymour's majority, 3,320.

The coin now in the Treasury is reported at \$87,000,000, of which \$22,000,000 is in gold certificates.

Mayor McMichael and a delegation of Philadelphia Councilmen arrived in Boston on Saturday. They were received by Mayor Shurtleff.

Iowa gave 23,020 majority for negro suffrage. Forty-one counties give Grant 31,057 majority, a gain of 18,820.

The 29th United States infantry, now in Memphis, has been ordered to Austin, Texas.

The Governor of Louisiana has recommended the observance of November 20th as a day of Thanksgiving.

The planing mill of Roscoe, Clark & Co. and Forepaugh's menagerie, on Ridge avenue, in Philadelphia, were burned on Saturday evening.

About thirty adventurers held a meeting in St. Louis on Friday, and resolved to organize a filibustering expedition against Cuba.

Major Pauline Cushman, the notorious Union spy during the rebellion, has been held to answer for stealing \$41 from a man named Newcomb, in New York.

Two laborers were killed by a land slide, at Gardner, Mass., on Friday last.

A tenement house in Boston was destroyed by fire on Saturday, and a man named McCormick perished in the flames.

The hardware store of Skinner, Neal & Co., and the queensware house of Westerman & Maier, in St. Louis, were burned yesterday morning. Loss \$125,000.

Harvey's oil cloth factory in Brooklyn, N. Y., was burned last night. Loss \$50,000.

Earthquakes continue in Chili and Peru, doing considerable damage to property, but no loss of life is reported.

A civil war is feared in Peru, owing to support given to Errázuriz for President.

Gioacchino Rossini, the great Italian musical composer, died in Paris on Saturday, aged 77 years.

Seventy thousand friendly Indians are reported to be moving to the new reservations provided by treaty.

Governor Hays of Ohio, has commuted the sentence of Mrs. Victor, who was to be hanged for the murder of her brother, to imprisonment for life.

Rev. A. J. Rooks, Rector of the Church of the Blessed Virgin, (Episcopal) and leader of Ritualism, in Memphis, Tennessee, has published a card announcing his intention to unite with the Roman Catholic Church.
