The United States Senate.

Twenty-two United States Senators, one third of the entire Senate as now constituted will go out of office on the 4th of March next. They are: Bayard of Delaware, Buckelew of Pennsylvania, Chandler of Michigan, Conness of California, Dixon of Connecticut, Doolittle of Wisconsin, Edmunds of Vermont, Frelinghuysen of New Jersey, Henderson of Missouri, Hendricks of Indiana, Morgan of New York, Morrill of Maide, Patterson of Tonnessee, Ramsey of Minnesota, Sprague of Rhode Island, Stewart of Nevada, Sumner of Massachusetts, Tipton of Nebraska, Van Winkle of West Virginia, Wade of Ohio, Welch of Florida and Whyte of Maryland.

Of this mimber, six are Democrats and sixeen Republicans. Eight of the prospective vacancies have already been filled, and fourteen remain to be provided for.

Of the eight new Senators already elected two are now members of the Senate and are chosen for new terms. These are, Edmunds of Vermont, and Sprague of Rhode Island, both Republicans. Abijah Gilbert, of Florida, Republican, has been chosen to succeed A. S. Welch, also a Republican. Gov. Buckingham. of Connecticut, Republican, has been elected in place of Dixon, Democrat; and Brownlow, Republican, of Tennessee, in place of Patter-

On the other hand, the Hon. Allen G. Thurman, Democrat, has been chosen by the Legislature of Ohio to succeed Wade, Republican; and Eugene Casserly, also a Democrat, is to take the sent of John Conness, of California, a Republican. Maryland has also chosen William T. Hamilton in place of William Pinckney Whyle, both Democrats. So fur the new elections leave the political charncier of the Senate the same as before.

Of the fourteen retiring Senators for whom successors have yet to be provided, four are Democrats—namely: Bayard, of Delaware; Buckalew, of Pennsylvania; Doolittle, of Wisconsin, and Hendricks, of Indiana. Bayard will very likely be re-elected, but each of the others is sure to be succeeded by a Republican, We are not aware, however, who the new Senators from Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and Indiana, are likely to be. Of the remaining tou whose terms expire with the present Congress, all of whom are Republicans, the place of one only-Frelinghuysen, of New Jersey-will be filled by a Democrat. The rest will all be succeeded by Republicans.

The net political result of all these changes viil be to take two votes from the Democratic minority of the Senate and add them to the Republican majority. - Phila. Post.

From Mexico. - The steamer Imperatrice, from Vera Cruz, brings still later dates from Mexico. There were many rumors, some of them claiming to come from reliable sources, that Mexico is on the eve of a revolution. It is asserted that the people are disgusted with the administration of Juaruz; that the President is controlled by Kerdo di Tejada; that the is controlled by Kerdo di Tejada; that the government officials act as they please, and there is no protection for American residents.

It was reported that General Alatorre, would head a revolution against Juarez, for the purpose of placing Porfirio Diaz at the head of the Republic.

FROM CUBA.—General Dulco has issued his proclamation to the Cubaus. The news from the interior is to the effect that Count Valmazedo is marching towards Bayamo. The revolutionary forces, strong in numbers, are besieging Gibaro and other towns, and 7000 of them are holding Colonel Tona in check at Tunas. The Marquis Santa Lucia and General Castillo, at the head of the rebel bands, remain in the neighborhood of Puerto Principe.
