Money Market. In Philadelphia, the prospects of a very casy money market are very satisfactory. The banks continue to report heavy receipts of corrency from the West, and this daily increase in the volume of money is producing an easier feeling in financial circles and a relaxation in the asking rates of interest for all kinds of loans. The banks are now abundantly supplied with capital, which they freely loan out on good security at legal rates of interest, but the demand had fallen off considerably yesterday, and the indications of an approaching plethora towards the end of the week may, if verified, necessitate a still further deline in the rates of discount.
