Very few of our people have any accurate idea of the real, magnitude of the debt. A correspondent of the Philadelphia Daily News furpishes the following interesting statement :

"The debt of the United States is a weighty, concern in more senses than one." Calculated in silver is would weight 67,960 tons of 2240 ponuds each. In gold it would weigh A188 tons. This amount of silver would freight minety four vessels' of six hundred and 'fiteen tons, each; and loaded in, wagons, a ton to each wagon, allowing forty feet for wagon and homes; would make a train four hundred and thirty-nine miles long, which train, following the regular course of travel, would reach from San Francisco'to the city of Austin, Nevada: It would take forty seven thousand nine hundred and fifteen thousand sight hundred and eighty horges, and fily seyen thousand, nine hundred and forty teamsters. It would take eight men thirtytwo years to count it, supposing they could count sixty silver dollars in a minute, and work eight hours a day, including Sundays. These dollars laid flat on the ground, with their edges touching, would extend six thousand nino hun-dred and thirty-two miles—a silver rope reaching from Now York' to San' Francisco and back.


