Dear Sir: - Your letter to Gov. Geary of Dec. 0th was mislaid, which will account for the delay in answering it. You have the right to geleck any uniform that you may deem most advisable; the Governor not desiring to assume the duty of prescribing the same. My own preference, however, is for the regular United States uniform, as the cheapest and best adapted to the pervice, and it is being almost, universally adopted in this and other States, except for companies of Zounves, which of course require a different uniform.

Letters from Wisconsin.

Milwaukir, Wisconsin, Jan. 10, 1868.

Dran Ender:—As I have to wait at this that the command of Valmasedo was interested for an hour or two on the train which is to carry me further west into the interior of this State, I thought I would write you a line. I came up from Chicago in the night train, and was awakened this morning by the conand was awakened this morning by the conductor announcing "Milwaukie," as the train thundered into a wooden structure, called a "Depot." When we came out of the car and looked at the low wooden buildings and untidy streets that were around'us, we thought Milwaukie may be one of the great cities of the west, but we could see no signs of greatness here. We took a "bus" and went up to the St. Charles for our breakfast. After we had crossed the river the city pre- the populace, a policeman and a soldier were sented a different appearance. The streets killed, and two citizens wounded, one mortally. were built up with large massive blocks of buildings, gotten up in a style that will compare with any thing of the kind outside of the scaboard cities. The western part of the city is building up very rapidly with small wooden buildings, but the streets are laid out at all

kinds of angles, and do not look so neat and

clean as they should.

It was Saturday morning and I went out to see what kind of a market they had. There are no market houses here, but they have what they call a market in almost every ward of the city. I visited one of these institutions, and found three or four meat stalls under cover, at the corner of two streets; all else was out in the open air. Hucksters and those who sold poultry, potatoes, apples, &c., were standing on the street outside of the curbstone facing the pavement, and the venders of butter, eggs, &c., stood up in a line on the inside of the pavement facing out, holding their baskets, or buckets, of butter and eggs before them. It was a novel sight to me to look at this row of stalwart men and women standing there, each one holding their basket or bucket before them, in which they exhibited what they had to sell, to crowds of people who boassed along the pavement. This row of egg and butter venders extended nearly two squares, where they were exposed to the cold, piercing wind which swept up from the lake. If some of the citizens of Reading who growl about the poor accommodations they have would come here. they would be glad to have even the poor accommodation those old market sheds afford.

Butter was solling at 85 cents, eggs 35 cents, potatoes 70 cents a bushel, apples \$1 50 a bushel-turkeys 15 cents per pound, chickens 12 couts per pound, (elganed), beef 20 cents and pork 14 cents. There did not appear to be the abundance here that comes into your

market.

Milwaukie reminds us of Reading in two particulars—her German population and loger beer broweries. They chaim here to make the best lager in the world, but some of the Reading breweries would not be willing to admit that. For my part, not being a judge of the beverage, I could not decide, but invited some of them to come east and look at our oxtensive breweries and taste our lager, and I thought they would be willing to admit that we equalled them at least, if we did not surpass them in both quantity and quality.

There is quite a number of good flouring mills in the city, which are propelled by water from the river, and himufacture a large amount of flour annually. quite a wide-awake business place, of about 5,000 inhabitants. It is situated on the Milwaukig and St. Paul Railroad, 65 miles from Milwaukie, in a rich farming country. This has been a wheat growing county, but the climate and soil is better adapted to grazing or dairy business, and many of the best farmers are now turning their attention to the manufacturing of cheese.
