PERMANGANATE of potassa, it is assorted, is the most effectual agent in deodorizing and cleansing old cider and beer barrels, musty cans and bottle. It is stated that a pint of the permanganate turned into the most musty, filthy cider or beer cask, and rinsed about a few moments, will entirely decompose all fungoid growths and fermenting matter, and render the cask as sweet as those that are new. The deodorizing, disinfecting power of the permanganate, holding as it does five equivaents of oxygen, is reported to be wonderful, it will even deodorize carbolic acid. The only way to remove immediately the order of car. bolic acid from the hands is to imnierse them in the liquid permanganate. The officinal solution contains four grains of the permanganate of potassa to one fluid ounce of water. Condy's disinfecting fluid, a famous agent for purifying unclean rooms, contain eight grains of the

A NEW velocipede has been invented in Portland, Mo. 1 It has three wheels, but a fourth is to be added. The motion is communicated either with the hands or feet, or with both, and the vehicle is capable of being attached to a horse and drawn like an ordinary buggy. The steering apparatus is managed by the knees of the rider. There are several other differences, said to be improvements, and ingeniously contrived.

Velocipede building now forms an important branch of trade in Paris. There are not only manufactories of these new locomotives. but foundries where the iron work of which they are composed is cast. One of these employs two hundred and fifty workmen, and finishes twelve velocipedes per day for a coachbuilder of Lyons. A Lyonese velocipediat is willing to take any bet that he will beat the fastest trotter in a race.

HEAVES IN HOBSES .- There is probably no sure remedy for the heaves, but the disease is said to be ameliorated by feeding corn-stalks and also by the use in the same way! of pumpkins. At this time of year, when pumpkins and cornstalks are both plenty, the experiment may be easily tried. Carrots are good for horses thus affected.
