A FUSE for exploding nitro-glycerine, recently invented, consists of a small tube containing some phosphorus, a small piece of copper wire, a glass of copper is recommended. From this tube a pipe is connected with the nitro-glycerine, the end of which is carefully taped. A spark from the electric machine explodes the charge immediately. Great care is to be taken in preparing the fuse to have the composition composition preserved from dampness. The fuse may be either a magneto-electric battery or a battery of electrical cells.
