WHO SHALL BE OUR NEXT GOVERNOR?

Much of last summer was spent by Professor Gangee in studying the disease of Western cattle disease, and he is about to proceed to Texas in a few weeks, for the purpose of examining into the conditions existing there, under which cattle, apparently perfectly healthy when they leave that country, become diseased after travelling northward.
