The circular states that the Union being established upon principles of strict justice, having for its object the protection and furtherance of the interests of the employer and the employed, it is desirable that all disputes which may arise between them shall be submitted to arbitration, as the most speedy and equitable way of arriving at a conclusion; and that it shall therefore be the constant aim of this Union to see that this desire be as far as possible carried out. The arbitration shall consist of an equal number of employers and employed, and if a decision is arrived at the same shall be final, said disputants binding themselves to respect and abide by the decision of the majority of the Arbitration Committee.

The employing printers of New York had an important meeting on Monday afternoon in the Astor House, the result of which is a declared determination not to comply with the demands of the Union. The attendance was quite numerous, and the proceedings very harmonious. Mr. Wm. C. Martin occupied the chair, The Executive Committee submitted a report, setting forth that several offices have now all the hands needed at the old scale, and one firm has a large number of applications over what they can entertain. Applications for work from country compositors were quite numerous. The representations in the press in regard to certain employing printers having yielded to the strike were false. A few had under compulsion, acceded temporarily, but they had determined not to recognize the Union scale.

Several gentlemen urged the adoption of a resolution, in favor of sustaining men not belonging to the Union. Another Mr. (Peletrean) said he would pledge himself to go back to his office and discharge every man who did not quit the Union. Mr. Baker said that would only increase the present difficulty. He said, further, that this strike is kept up by the compositors on the morning and evening papers, because they have in view themselves to strike for 60 cents.

Finally resolutions were adopted pledging to stand by each other in the furnishing of workmen, and to continue resistance to the strike; also appointing a committee of three to consult with master-printers in regard to the expediency of retaining Union hands in their employment.
