

NEWS ITEMS.

—Some glass-blowers while on a spree, drove up to Mr. Hart's tavern, Mansfield, Pa., on Saturday last, and being refused admittance, forced their way in, dragged out the members of the family and beat them most cruelly. Resistance was offered in the course of the struggle, shots were fired and the bottles and glass shot freely used. Thus far the ruffians have escaped justice.

—At Nashville, Monday, Representative Brown was thrashed by State Comptroller Blackburn, for introducing a resolution reflecting upon the latter in the Tennessee Legislature. Mr. Coyle, another Representative, having attacked a newspaper reporter named Mulloney, was also punished by the latter.

—In Washington yesterday, a clerk of the Patent Office, named Duncan, was convicted by Mr. Dempsey, of the stationery firm of Dempsey & O'Toole. It is alleged that Mr. Duncan had spoken disparagingly to the Commissioner of Dempsey's veracity, hence the assault.

—A woman widow of New Jersey has won \$6000 in a branch of promise cast at Jersey City, against a widower of eighty. A printer of St. Louis has also won \$5000 in a similar case against a damsel of twenty.
