SAD ACCIDENT - A MAN TERRIELY SOALD-SAD ACCIDENT A MAN TERRIELY SCALD-ND. Yesterday afterneon, about 3) o'click, Mr. John Lozer, an employee at Lauer's Lager Beer Brewery, on N. 3rd SL, in attempt-ing to adjust a pulley over a tub of bolling water in the brewery, fell in and was terribly scalded—from the effects of which he is hour-ly expected to die. It appears that the opera-ting of the brewery had been suspended for some days to give thus to make necessary resome days, to give time to make necessary repairs to the machinery ; and these having been finished, the vats were filled with water which was heated to clean the brewery. When the water was heated to clean the brewery. When the water was heated enough for use, one of the belts was found to be out of order, and it was belts was found to be out of order, and it was immediately over one of the vata. Lozer took a board from a pile, which was about an inch thick, and placed it across the tub. The tub is six feet deep and ten feet in diameter.
