Extract from Election Laws for the City of Reading. The following extract from an Act passed by the Pennsylvania Legislature on the 20th of April, 1864.

Section 8.—That the qualified voters of the City of Reading, at their annual election for city officers, may vote, for said officers, upon two written, or printed, tickets, or slips of paper, one of which shall be headed "city officers," and contain the names of the candidates for mayor, city treasurer, city auditor, and select and common councils, for whom they desire to vote.
