IMPOUTANT TO VOTERS. Extract from Election Laws for the City of Heading.

The following extract from an Act passed by the Pennsylvania Legislature on the 26th of April, 1864, entitled "An Act revising (the charter of the municipal corporation of the city of Reading," will be of interest to our citizens at the present time. Ballots should be prepared and voted in the manner therein described:

Section 8.—That the qualified voters, of the city of Reading, at their annual election for city officers, may vote, for said officers, upon two written, or printed, tickets, or slips of paper, one of which shall be headed "city officers," and contain the names of the candidates for mayor, city trensurer, city auditor, and select and common councils, for whom the votors desire to vote, and the other shall be headed "ward officers," and contain the names of the candidates for alderman, constables, judge, and inspectors, of elections, controllers of schools, and assessor, for whom they may desire to vote.

THE EASTERN QUESTION.

Turkey is opposed to making further concessions to the Peace Conference. Russia is extremely hostile to Turkey, although estensibly in favor of peace. The Russian troops are all being armed with needle guns. Greece refuses, to resume friendly relations with her old tyrant, Turkey, and the masses of the Russian people are in favor of a war with that heathen power. The police of St. Petersburg are kept busy tearing down inflammatory placards posted on the walls by unknown parties, urging the Russian people to send assistance to the Greeks in their "sacred war", against the Turks. The French are preparing to interfere in the matter, and a general war is probable. A Polish legion is being formed at Constantinople, to fight against the Russians in the event of a war. It will be the war of the cross ngainst the crescent, and Christian nations should not hesitate which side to aid by sympathy and advice.

THE SOLAR ECLIPSE of August 17th, 1868, was observed by several corps of European astronomers, who went to India for the purpose. The German astronomers have just made a report of their operations to the Berlin Geographical Society, but as the eclipse was only visible at Bombay for six seconds, the account could not have been very satis factory. One of the observers, however, gave a curious description of the proceedings of the natives. During the period of the eclipse the assembled natives paid no attention to the phenomenon itself, as they were entirely engrossed with watching the tent and the operations of the European magicians. INDIAN FIGHT.-A Helens, Montana, dispatch, says a war party of Pew Dorcell Inlians attacked several lodges on Blood's Run river crossing, near Fort Shaw. Six were killed and six wounded. They carried off twenty-five horses. A detachment from Fort Shaw pursued but did not overtake them.
