CLEANING OF GLASS.-To clean a glass thoroughly, and 'restore its original lustre, after the ordinary methods have failed, recourse may be had to hydro-fluoric acid such as is sold by the chemical establishments in small gutta percha bottles. This is to be diluted with four to five times its volume of water. A few drops of the solution placed upon a wad of cotton, and the surface of the glass thoroughly rubbed over with it, and then ought to correspond with the reduction in the price of grain.

Washed off with a good deal of water. The surface of the glass will be dissolved by this application and a new one laid bare. This process is well adapted to restoring the brightness of lenses of spectacles or spy-glasses, dimmed by age. If a concentrated solu-tion of this acid be allowed to remain for some time upon glass, a cavity will be produced, remarkable for its brilliant lustre.

St. Valentine's Day.—To-morrow is the day set downin the calendar as sacred to those who worship the little god Cupid, and when-

"There is one heart that beats with thine, Which saddens when thine eye is sad, Aches when thy spirit doth repine, And thrills with joy when thou art glad."

This is emphatically Lovo's grand gala day, and, as such, will be enjoyed by thousands of those who worship at its shrine. It may seem strange that it should happen at a season of the year generally so unpropitious to our climate; but it must be borne in mind that the day had its origin in a more congenial climate than our own-in fair and sunny Italy-where Fobruary weather is better calculated to fan the flames kindled by Cupid than that with which we are usually favored here. It's origin, it is true, has been much controverted, but historians unite in assuring us that St. Valontine was a verity—(not a myth)—a presby-ter of the Church, who suffered martyrdom under Cladius II at Rome, A. D. 271. But why a son of the church—whose claim on the historic page seems only to rest upon the fact that he scaled his faith with his life—should have his name linked with this practice, we cannot divine. The observance of the day, in the opinion of Brande, originated in an ancient Roman custom, of choosing patrons on the 14th of February for the year to come. But other authorities advance other opinions. It is the day, as is popularly believed; on which the birds make choice of their mates for the coming year; and there is a graceful legend of the Saint's martyrdom in which the birds and bishops are so closely combined that the fes-tival seems rather their joint property, than a matter of dispute between them. Whilst Valentine was in the agonies of mar-tyrdom, two doves, hovered restlessly and sadly-above the place, testifying by their motions the liveliest interest in the proceedings, and their sorrow for his sufferings, and when at last his exhausted body sank under the severity of the terture, they lighted on his bosom for a moment, kissed his lips with their rosy-tipped bills, and side by side soared up with a standar and could flight until they were with a steady and equal flight until they were lost among the clouds. Whether the practice, therefore, of young people on this day choosing their particular friends, or Valentine, is in honor of the martyred bishops, or in imitation of the birds, is a question so profound, and about which so much is to be said on both sides, that we beg leave to decline it.—State
