### POMEROY ON ANDREW JOHNSON.

The following article, from "Brick Pomeroy's New York Democrat, expresses our sentiments so exactly that we publish it entire: PRESIDENT JOHNSON.

In a few days the last of the Presidents of agroeing to the Constitution of the country, will have vacated the Executive chair and the destinies of America will pass into the in his efforts for power for himself and pluntier for his minions, by a parliament of thieves, robbers, land grabbers, plunderers, extrava-gant aristocrats, tools of tyranny, and fit agents for the bonded slave holders of the land, it is with a feeling of sadness we look upon the future of this country. It is with a feeling of dread for the peace, prosperity, and good name of Autrica that we lament the day is so near when the last of our constitutional Presidents, or Presidents who believe in the Constitution, and faithfully endeavor to uphold it, shall be compelled in obedience to laws made by the people, and respected by him, to leave the chair of State in the hands of a man who has no policy, no aim, no ambition other than to please a tew men who are his keepers.

We did not vote that Andrew Johnson should be President. On the contrary, we voted against him, worked against him, spont money against his election, did all in our power openly, earnestly, and honestly to defeat him. Not because he was Andrew Johnson, but because he was the candidate of a very bad, solfish, wicked, unprincipled party. But we have learned to respect Mr. Johnson; to look upon him as a statesman and a lover of his country. We have learned to admire him as a Prosident. Our sympathies have gone out toward him from day to day, as we have seen him struggling against fearful odds, shielding the last remnants of the Constitution and determination, tenacity, and regard for consthough he might die. We have learned to respect him, for he has shown himself worthy of respect. We have learned to regard him as the upholder of liberty, the law and the Constitution, for he has proven himself worthy the confidence of every man who loves the right and hates the wrong. As he has defended the Constitution, others have made war upon him. As he has endeavored to protect the States bleeding at the feet of power, others, by illegal enactments and unjust laws, have shorn him of all power to protect, till be stands in the political world a monument of better days, proud, erect, and upright, as he has been devoted to liberty, a pattern for other statesmen to emulate, a most terrible shame upon those who, in warring upon him, have warred upon the rights and interests of the people who elected them to serve rather than rob them.

When Johnson goes, the Constitution goes with him. On the Fourth of March, when he leaves the White House, the last of the Presidents leave; the first of the Dictators enter. There will be no more Presidents in this country till the Democratic party comes into power, and elects men of boldness, pluck, carnestness, and decision of character, and regard for constitutional obligations-men who will care more for the people than for a select few who now boast their ability to rob the peo-

when once he had the opportunity, breaking the egg before the serpent was hatched, which has coiled itself about the throat of the Executive, deprived him of power to protect the weak, or punish those who offend the laws. We blame him for not declaring Congress a body of conspirators long since, and immuring them in some of the prison ships of the country or blowing them into the air. We blame him for not taking the power from Congress, by force if necessary, and holding it in the hands of an honest man, rather than suffer it to be taken from him for the benefit of dishonest men.

But we have more to respect than blame him for, but trust the State of Tennessee will, at its earliest opportunity, make him Governor, or return him to Washington to look after her interests. There is life in Andrew Johnson yet. The day is coming when he will have it in his power to settle with very many of his enemies either directly, or by the nid, efforts, or interposition of men who, like him. love their compary.

INDIAN AFFAIRS. -On Thursday, the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs examined Col. J. H. Leavenworth, Agent of the Camanche. Apache and Kiowa Indians, in relation to the attack made by Gen. Custer on the camp of Black Kettle. Col. Leavenworth's, statement contradicts Gen. Custer's report in nearly every material point. He said there material point. He said there were but thirty lodges sattacked, when Custer reported fifty-three, that there were but 15 to 20 warriors killed, and Custer reported 103. Col. Leavenworth said that there were about eighty five women and children killed, and that the Indians all ngreed in their assertion that twenty-eight soldiers were found by them to have been killed; Mrs. Blane, the white captive woman, the Col-onel said, must have been shot by the troops, as the Indians affirm that she was struck while running towards the soldiers, the bullet entering her face and passing out at the back of her head .- Phila. Ledger.

The New Bounty Law. The new Bounty Law, reported by Representative H. D. Washburn, from the Committee on Military Affairs, proposes to allow every soldier, sailor or marine (including slaves and those recognized by Congress in an act of February 18th, 1862, for the defense of Washington,) who have faithfully served and been honorably discharged, the sum of eight and one-third dollars per month for all the time he has served between April 12th, 1861, and April 19th, 1865. To any soldier discharged for wounds received in battle, or in the line of his duty. the allowance shall be computed to the end of the term for which he enlisted. The unmarried widow, or if there be none, the children, or if none, the parents of every such soldier, sailor or marine who has died shall receive the sum to which he would have been entitled. But in computing the bounty to a soldier, sailor or marine, or his representatives, all bounties heretofore paid, or now payable, by the nation. State, city, county, town or by any municipal corporation of voluntary association; and all prize money paid or payable shall be deducted, so that the aggregate bounties from all sources shall in every case equal, and in no case exceed \$81-3 for each month of actual, faithful service. # BYTHE CUBA CABLE,

IMPORTANT PROCLAMATION-LIBERTY OF THE PRESS BUSPENDED-AMNESTY PROCLAMATION WITHDRAWN.

Havana, Web. 13.—Captain General Dulce has, just issued an important proclamation. He recites that whereas the insurgents have refused up to this date to accept the amnesty proffered in his former proclamation; and whereas others are continually joining the in-surrectionary forces, therefore the proclamation of annesty is withdrawn. The liberty of the press is also suspended for the time, and the former consorship is re-established. The printing and distribution of newspapers with out permission from the government authori-des is prohibited, and all persons guilty of violating the press law, and all political prison-ers in future will be tried by const-martial.

THE CUBAN REVOLUTION. - The Diario admits that the revolutionists hold possession of the entire Puerto Principe district, except the city proper. Several secret deposits of arms have

been discovered at Cardenas. The rebels have made the town of Menicarague their rullying point. Arrests of suspected parties continue to be made. Several Americans and other foreigners are among hose now in custody.

A PROVIDENCE paper announces that a rope valker will begin on the first of June the feat of propelling a velocipede three thousand miles in thirty days, averaging one hundred miles a day, for a wager of \$5000. During the trip he is to ride the velocipede one hundred and fifty miles in twenty four hours, and only one trial will be allowed.

Persia: -- Advices from Persia state that the Persian army, with the Shah at its head, has zone to Bagdad. In the meantime, the Turksh troops are pushing forward to the Persian frontier.
