The removal of building stone from both sides of the summit had left the crest but about ten feet wide, and from twonty to fifty feet above the numercus open quarries along its sides; but a visit to the top of the mountain yes-torday, showed us that man, the great destroyor, had invalled the crest also, which has in several places lost its rugged outline, and become round and smooth with a reduction in height of some ten feet. nany of them need no shaping, being as smooth and square as though prepared by the hand of a mason. Should the prosent rate of improvement in our city continue, which we believe will be the ease, in a fow years Mount Penn will become a smooth and rounded hill, unrecognizable by those who have not seen it for some years past.

The beautiful chestnut groves on the eastern side of the mountain are fast falling before the axe. Their removal, in our humble opinion, sadly mars the beauty of the scenery; but in these progressivo days the ornamental is almost always sacrificed to the useful. Still, we regret to witness the destruction of forest trees, and sympathize with the fabled wood nymphs who flee from the sound of the woodman's axe.

Descending the eastern side of the nountain, we found that the thousands f pretty and symmetrical young codars in the field on the eastern slope had been recently trimmed, and the removed branches had been burned in heaps. This necessary work, though somewhat detracting from the rugged beauty of the landscape, is still a great improvement, and the neatly trimmed young trees, in their dress of "eternal green," are a beautiful sight, and well worthy of a

PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE.

OFFICE OF ATTORNEY GENERAL, HARRISBURG, February 17, 1869.

To the Honorable the Senate of the Commonwealth of Pennsyluania :

The Attorney General in reply to the resolution of your honorable body, of the date of 27th January, 1869, would respectfully beg leave to report ! That in his opinion the act of February 25, 1866. repealing all taxes on real estate for State purposes, is constitutional.
