FROM WASHINGTON. The ultra radicals in Washington are endeavoring to throw A. T. Stewart, a New York, out of his new position as Secretary of the Treasury, on account of the act of Sept. 2, 1893, which debarred persons engaged in the importing business from holding such a position. A bill providing for the repeal of this act was introduced into the Senate on Saturday by Mr. Patterson, and was sustained by Mr. Sherman, but Mr. Sumner, of Massachusetts, objected, and the bill was laid on the table. The appointment of Mr. Stewart is not satisfactory to the radicals, and their vexation is unconcealed.

President Grant has made the following appointments: Gen. A. Terry to command the Department of the South. Gen. Meade is assigned to the Division of the Atlantic, headquarters at Philadelphia. Gen. Sheridan to the Department of Louisiana. Gen. Hancock to Dakota Territory. Gen. Canby to the First Military District. Gen. Gillam to duty with his regiment. Gen. J. J. Reynolds to command the Fifth Military District. Gen. Emory to the Department of Washington. Appointing Sheridan to the command of Louisiana will enable that officer to wreak his vengeance on the people of New Orleans, because they made no secret of their contempt for the silly popinjay when he was formerly in command there, and displayed himself in a carriage drawn by four horses, decorated with nodding plumes and all the insignia of a second Gessler.

Sending Gen. Hancock to Dakota Territory is a piece of spite work—in other words, he is to be punished for being a Democrat, and for refusing to join the Grand Army of the Republic. Gen. Gillam is sent to his regiment because he dared to tell the truth in regard to the Arkansas election, where the radicals falsely claimed a victory for the negro suffrage "constitution". Gen. J. J. Reynolds has already proved himself a fitting tool for tyrants in Texas.

The appointment of the most unpopular man who can be found in the army to command the different "departments" and "divisions" of the South, appears to be a strange mode of obtaining that "peace" which Grant seemed so desirous of securing before the election. The open rebellion of Mr. Sumner against the appointment of Mr. Stewart shows that the Massachusetts Senator has not yet forgotten his old habit of resisting the will of the President. Such opposition will result in a collision between the President and Congress unless the radicals are more careful hereafter.

The fact that Gen. Meade received no promotion, and that the title of Lieutenant-General, to which he was properly entitled, was conferred upon Sheridan, causes much comment. We think it probable that Meade will yet receive a profitable appointment, perhaps the position of Secretary of War on the retirement of Gen. Schofield. His nomination as the radical candidate for Governor of Pennsylvania is spoken of, though the latter position would be a trifling one compared with that of Lieutenant-General for life, with a salary of \$10,000 a year.

The tax-payers may well ask, "Why do we need a General and Lieutenant General, besides a number of Major Generals and Brigadiers, for an army of fifty thousand men?" We can only answer, "Let us have peace!" It is very evident that while the Democracy intend to oppose impartial manhood suffrage, they will do what they can to identify themselves with female suffrage, so that hereafter we may expect to see and hear of the champion of Democratic candidates, the ablest of our lady orators in the land, who, as a matter of self-advancement in politics, will be organized to attach themselves to that organization.—Harrisburg State Guard.

THE WAR IN CUBA.—Cuban soldiers state that the rebels have concentrated at Matari, and troops marched against them from Santiago de Cuba. In an engagement near Santa Esprita, the rebels lost 12 killed, many wounded, and nine taken prisoners. The Government loss is not given. The rebels have appeared in force near Cienfuegos and Palmillos. The roads are blocked, and no sugar is coming in from Cienfuegos. All the loyal citizens in Sagua District have been compelled to abandon their houses, in consequence of the depredations of the insurgents.

The rebel Brigadier-General Arava was taken prisoner and brought to Cagua, where he was shot on the following Saturday. A fight had occurred between some colored volunteers and a band of colored insurgents in the neighborhood of Santiago, in which seventeen of the latter are reported killed.

The insurgents are increasing in numbers near Remedios. 316 political prisoners are to be sent to the penal settlement of Fernando Po. 109 Cuban refugees arrived at Baltimore, Md., on Friday.

THE PARAGUAYAN WAR.—Advices from Paraguay state that President Lopez had an army with him, and was fortifying in the interior of the country. The dissensions among the allied Generals had culminated in the resignation of the Marquis de Caxias and General Herval, and the supreme command of the allied forces had been conferred on the Brazilian General De Souza.

GREAT BRITAIN. London, March 6.—Seven Fenians, imprisoned in various parts of the kingdom, have been liberated. Their names are as follows: Thomas F. Burke, the American Fenian organizer; Dennis K. Burke, recently confined at Clerkenwell; Charles Rickham, post one of the editors of the Irish People; Captains Mackay and O'Connor, Stack and O'Keefe—the latter sentenced to ten years' imprisonment for having written a treasonable article published in the Irish People. O'Connor, Stack and O'Keefe are liberated unconditionally.

PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—In the Senate various bills were introduced, among them one by Mr. Grimes, to reorganize the navy. Mr. Patterson introduced a bill to repeal the clause of the act establishing the Treasury Department which disqualified for the Secretaryship persons engaged in trade or commerce. He asked its immediate consideration, but Mr. Sumner objected, and it was referred.

After some further business, a message was received from the President, asking Congress to relieve Mr. A. T. Stewart from his disqualification. Mr. Sherman offered a bill for the purpose similar to that proposed by Mr. Patterson, but Mr. Sumner again objecting, it was not received. The House was not in session, having adjourned until Tuesday.

Gen. Sheridan arrived at Fort Hayes on Saturday, on his way to Washington. There is said to be not one hostile Indian now in the Department of the Missouri.
