GENERAL NEWS

Railroad Be Revived?

SUCH SAID TO BE THE INTENTION

When Last Summer's Financial Flurry Struck the Scheme Considerable Progress Had Been Made with the Surveys and with Negotiations for the Right of Way-The Report Now Is That This Work will Be Resumed Early in the Spring-Other Railway Moves and Miscellaneous Gleanings.

Next spring it is understood to be the intention of the capitalists inter-ested in the processed Philadelphia, Howest 1: and Albany reitroad to c n inue the surveys and o say negotiations interrupted by the financial panic of last sum-mer; and if these are satisfactory, to go on at an early date with the practical work of grading and track laying. Some difficulty has been encountered in capitalizing the scheme. largely because of the unsettled condi-tion of the New England coal market; but under an alliance with the Fitchonrg road it is believed the new line can secure satisfactory traffic pledges and thus make a stronger bid for the investment of idle capital. There was talk not long ago of Simpson & Wat-kins being interested in the idea of a northeastern outlet for anthracits ship ments, more direct than any yet in existence Whether the 'Wayne county ronte' had a part in this idea or not, it is believed to offer strong attractions for capital interested at the same time in anthracite mining.

It is announced that the extension of the Buffalo and Susquehanna railroad from the present terminus at Galeton, east of Ansonia, Pa, has been fully decided upon and the contract for the work will probably be let by the end of this month. The extension will be eighteen miles long and will give company a connection with the Fall Brook railroad, securing it an outlet to Williamsport and the Reading railroad, as well as a new connection with the New York, Lake Eric and Western. The line has been located.

According to the statement of James L. Blakesler, president of the Montrose railroad, the earnings of that road last year were \$18.672.69 and the expenditures \$21,330.92, leaving a deficit of \$3, 648,32 This was caused principally by improvements to the rolling stock and the road bed.

In his recent address before the American Society of Mechanical En-gineers, President Eckley B. Coxe-made a very interesting summary of his investigations of the problem of the successful utilization of the small sizes of anthracits. Putting himself in the positition of the manager of a steam plant burning, say 100,000 tons of rice coal per year, Mr. Coxe said he would try to make a contract which would require the coal to contain not over a certain percentage of water and not less than a certain perce bon, or, what is practically the same thing for anthracite, not over a certain percentage of ash, and that a certain percentage of the average daily sample of the coal would pass through a mesh of a certain size, and over a mesh of an other size, and that the coal should not contain more than a certain percentage of dust-dust being what would pass through a mesh of say one-sixteenth of an inch in diameter. He stated that if we know exactly how much coal is placed in the furnace (including what is left on the grate) and how much carbon there is in the ash, we can determine the exact amount of the carbon (originally in the coal) has been consumed, small portion carried that less up chimney with the fine ashes.

What the man who pays for the coal wants to know, is how much water can be evaporated for \$1 with different coals; and it is of no advantage to him to know that if he pays twice as much for his fuel he can evaporate 5 per cent more water per pound of fuel, and get a wonderful theoretical evaporation from his boiler. It is the question of how much more you can get for \$1 by using a certain coal, and to arrive at this result it is very important to know exactly what kind of fuel is being used whether it burned up, and whether it was artificially dried before it is put
