ENGLISH INVESTORS ARE SHY

Twenty-five hundred men were at work in the Pennsylvania Steel company's mills at Steelton yesterday. The plant is now restarting one Bessemer, one rail, the Merchant and two bloom mills, which will employ an aggregate force of 1,500 people.

Says the Philadelphia correspondent of the Herald that the Pennsylvania railroad is to issue a new plan. These maps are eagerly looked for by contractors and railroad reporters being supposed to be an indication of the intentions of the company for the year to come.
