

MITCHELL IS KNOCKED OUT

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MITCHELL GREET'S CORBETT.

The Two Fighters, When Arrested, Trade Pertinacious Compliments. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Jan. 25.—Soon after the return of Mitchell to the Everett house, and of Corbett to the St. James hotel, both were arrested on warrants charging them with having committed the offense of fighting by agreement.

The charge against Mitchell, it is understood, will be tried in the morning, but Corbett's case will be postponed to allow him to go to New York to keep his engagement at the Madison Square garden on Saturday night. In the event of Mitchell's trial resulting in a dismissal of the charge, as recent precedents indicate will be the case, Corbett's case will be dismissed on motion of his attorney without the necessity of his returning.

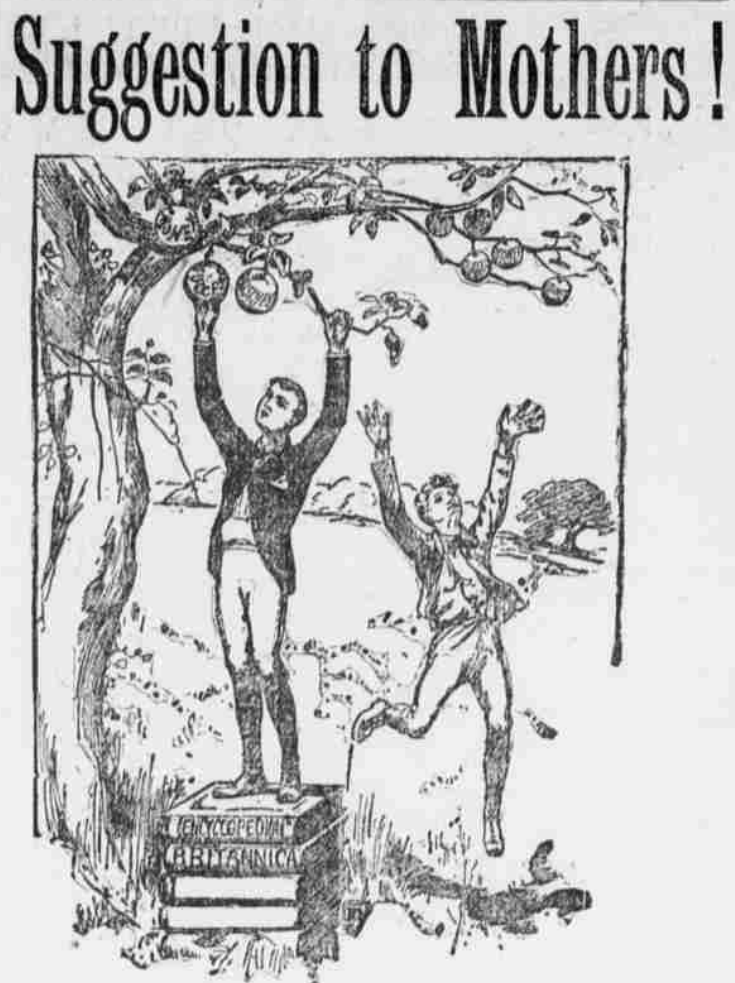
