Here is what Dan says concerning the iron trade: "In no direction are quotations of manufactured products nigher, but while some have actually declined, the general tone is somewhat stronger. Thus, district improvement it seen in the demand for iron products at Philadelphia, though for some, which it was thought could not go lower, quo tations have been reduced. Sales of pig are larger. Open quotation for bes-semer at Pittaburg is \$10.50 and southern forge is sold at \$7.75 at Birming ham. Connellaville coke is quoted at \$1 per ton, with the number of ovens in operation practically unchanged. The increase in demand for iron pro-

ducts is mainly in structural forms, cast pipe, wire rods, barbed wire and wire nails, while in rails and other railway iron business is remarkably small

The Illinois Steel mills started Tuesday with 800 men, and it is thought the mills will run steady for some time. On Monday next the rod mill of the filinois Steel company, which has been lying idle for a year, will start, and 600 men will be employed. Lambert & Bishop's wire mill, a branch of the Consolidated Steel and Wire company, will start also, giving employment to 800 men. Other small factories will also start up about that time.

In view of the more favorable re ports of railway earnings since the first of the year and the better ontlook for !6a17c. traffic the meeting of the presidents and general managers of the trunk lines and their western connections in New York today for the purpose of con sidering the new freight and passanger agreements recently drafted by the general agents of these two departments is invested with more than ordinary interest. The Defaware and Hudson company is commizing by suspending one brakeman on each passenger train. The building of the coal washery at Ebervale proceeds rapidly and it will soon be ready to be operated. This washery will be owned and operated by a Phila-delphia syndicate. Cutting of prices does not force the sale of coal, so that the only other remedy is now being enforced rigidly, and conse-quently restriction of production is more stringent than it has been for a long time past.

Twelve tracks are to be laid on this, and when completed it will give the company storage room for about 1,500 cars. Work on the crossings and signal sta-tions at Franklin switch of the New Jer-sey Central at Wilkes-Barre, says the Times is being pushed rapidly forward, and when this is completed, which will be in a fortnight, the work of grading the branch which is to run into the new But-ton wood breaker will be begun. The con-tract has already been let to the Borke brothers, of Scranton. There will be about two miles of tracks and several sidings.
