

THINGS OBSERVED AND NOTED.

Again rumor has it that Pittston is to have a new place of amusement. The appearance here last week of Danial L. Hart, who is managing Waite's Music Hall at Wilkes-Barre, has given rise to the rumor. Mr. Hart, in re-sponse to a query, stated: "Yes, Mr. Waite is fully imbued with the belief that Pittaton is an excellant show town and one that would prove extremely profitable if rightly managed. To do this it is our intention to erect, if we can't secure Music Hall, a building for such purposes that will be a credit to Pittston, architecturally and otherwise."
