FOREST CITY CHURCHES.

Brief Mention of the Houses of Worship and Other Buildings.

FOREST CITY, Feb. 3.—During the past twelve months Forest City has seen the erection of some handsome buildings, among them being Manzer & Leonard's block, F. J. Osgood's building, W. J. Maxey's block, Fred Straub's block, Hertz's block, J. McConnaughy's handsome three-story block, Henry O'Neil's block, and many others.

The Presbyterian church which was started last fall is nearly completed, with the exception of plastering and some other work. The church is of the same design as the Simpson Presbyterian chapel. It is situated on Upper Main street, adjoining the residence of Benjamin Maxey. This church, like the Congregational church, has a basement which is used for similar purposes. This society has been organized for a number of years and met in Maxey's hall for a long time, starting at five with a Sunday school, with William D. Bryden, sr., as superintendent.

DEATH OF S. E. RAYNOR.

A Well-known Citizen of Carbondale Joins the Silent Host.

CARBONDALE, Pa., Feb. 2.—Thursday morning at 6:30 o'clock occurred the death of Samuel E. Raynor at his home on Lynch avenue. It was in May, 1892, when Mr. Raynor was stricken with paralysis, from which he never fully recovered. Mr. Raynor was born in Montrose sixty-six years ago, and has been a resident of this city for sixty-two years. He was one of the oldest living members of the Presbyterian church, having joined that communion in 1836. In 1854 he was ordained a deacon, and in 1865 he was installed an elder. He also, as the Sabbath school superintendent, served the longest term of any in the history of the church.
