The nomination papers of Donnelly and McNamara were allowed to stand, but those of Sweeney and Corcoran were thrown out because the affidavit was not signed by five qualified electors. The Republican nomination papers for this and the other wards in which they were filed by a general nomination paper signed by electors throughout the whole borough were likewise declared illegal and

AN ORSINANCE

Providing for increasing the city debt for the purpose of building bridges and submitting the question of such increase to a vote of the electors thereof.

BESTION 1.—Be it ordained by the Select and Common Councils of the City of Scranton and it is hereby ordained by the sutherity of the same. That for the purpose of constructing a bridge over the Lackawanna river at Linden street, and a bridge over Rearing brook from Sprace street to Front street, together with the purchase of such right of way as may be necessary for the best approaches to said bridges, an increase of the city dath by the issue of city bonds in the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars is hereby authorized, subject, nevertheless, to the coment of the city of Scranton, as herein provided.

BEC. 2.—The question of assorting to the above proposed increase of the city debt shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of the City of Scranton, at the next ensuing general election occurring not less than forty days after the passage of this ordinance.

SEC. 3.—After the passage of this ordinance and at least thirty days before said election the Mayor shall publish a notice of the election hereby authorized, in three daily news papers of the City Controller.




