#### MANDAMUS VS. MANDAMUS.

Court Again to Be Asked to Pass Upon Pittston's Nominations.

The adversarial decision handed down by the court a few days ago concerning the various objections raised, particularly those relating to the Republican candidates, which in effect was that said nominations were not valid as party nominations, because of failure to comply with the law, which expressly provides that the proper officers of a party convention shall file their certificate of nomination with the county commissioners at least eighteen days before the election. The court decided that the delay was fatal as to the Republican ward nominations, because the certificates whatever were filed by officers of ward caucuses, but opportunity was given other candidates named in the Republican certificates to file nomination papers as in the case of the independent candidates or nominees of bodies of citizens other than regular party organizations.
