Interesting Statistics Touching the Volume of Freight Business Last Vear.

Synopsis of Their Reports to the Department of Internal Affairs at Harrisburg-Movement of Goods Not Steel Outlook-Salient Points in

From reports received at the state department of internal affairs it is shown that there has been an increase in all kinds of freights carried by railroads during the year 1893, except agri onltural products. Last year the rail-roads caried 19 174 726 tons, this year but 18,577,085. The Pennsylvania railroad shows an increased tonnage and most of the other roads a decrease. Last year the tonnage from our great mining interests amounted to 171 918 -484 to s. This year the amount is 180,-534 176, an increase of 8,620,692, or 5 per cent. The Pennsylvania; Polindelphia and Reading; New York, Lake Erie and Western; Delaware, Lacka-wanna and Western; and Northern Central practically carried all of the coal. In the report for last year, the products of forests were given at 15,853,703 tons; the amount this year, 16,602,476, an increase of 747 683 tons. Five companies carried 7,995,276 tons of this-The Pennsylvania; New York, Lake Erie and Western; Northern Central; Pul-adelphia and Reading; Western New York, and Pennsylvania. The tounage from manufacturers during the year was 40,171,802 tone as against 35 523, -399 in 1892. The companies carrying more than 1,000 000 of this traffic water the Allegheny Valley; Claveland and Pittsburg: Lake Shore and Michigan Southern: New York, Lake Ede and Western: Northern Central: Pennsylvania; Philadelphia and R saling; Phil adelphis, Wilmington and Baltimore Pittsburg, Cinclinniti, Chicago and St Louis: Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Cat

Under the head of miscellaneous merchandise the number of took reported last year was 20,862,902; thi 25,911,490; an increase of 5, 048 590 tons. Referring to the compen-sation of railroad employes it is said tha to the 200, 158 employes there was paid during the year \$118,123 788 75 an average compensation of \$590.17. The five companies employing the larges number of persons were the Penusylva nta, the Philadelphia and Reading, the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern, the New York, Lake Erie and Western, and the Pittsburg, Cincinnati, Caicag and St. Louis. During the year they companies had in their service 133,10 employes, or 66; per cent, of the entir number reported to the department. The compensation paid by these companies was \$79,738,931.24, or 874 per cent, of the entire amount out by all the roads.
