Commissioners Gardner and Sando

Report in Election Contest.

TIME FOR FILING EXCEPTIONS

Must Be Handled in On or Before

Mar. 1—Commissioners Examined

Five Hundred and Three Witnesses

and Have Found One Hundred and

Thirty-Two Votes to Be Illegal—

Names of Those Who Voted Illegally.

Commissioners C. B. Gardner and

M. F. Sando filed their report

in the contest instituted by Patrick

F. Hughes against J. J. Collins for

the office of school controller in

the Third and Fourth wards of

Carbondale.

They examined 503 witnesses

during the progress of the contest,

339 on the part of the contestant

and 364 on the part of the respondent.

Of these 132 were found to have voted

illegally from one cause or another.
