Startling Statement Made by the Pittsburg Times.

VICTIMIZED THE CARNEGIE CO.

Unearthing of a Gigantic Scheme to Bleed the Great Steel Company. The Workmen Forward Second Rate Armor Plate to the Government and Then Share in Rewards Given by the Navy Department for Exposing the Business--Other Industrial Notes.

The Pittsburg Times yesterday said: "The Carnegie Steel company, limited, has permitted itself to be made the vic tim of a big conspiracy. This in brief s the true explanation of the assessing of \$140,489,91 damages, or fine, laid by President Clevelan and Secretary of the Navy Herbert against the company for furnishing the government with armor plates, which, to quote Secretary Her-bert, was good, all excelling the lowest limit of tolerance in the specifica-tions, yet pertions of it were not up to the highest possible mark of excellence which by their contract the company was bound to attain. The conspirators were four in number, all well known workmen hereabouts, who, until recently, were em-ployed at the Carnegie's big Home-stead plant. The price they received from the government as a reward for their conspiracy was about \$35,000, or 25 percent of the damage assessment made by President Cleveland against the Carnegie company. This quartette FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL of scheming workmen were assisted in getting in touch with the government by a Pittsburg attorney whose office is within the shadow of the court house and by a premiuent ex-federal official whose home is in this state. The man ner in which these facts have leaked out is similar to that in which the famous Tweed conspiracy first became known in New York

"One of the conspirators who got but \$2,000 out of the \$35,000 reward paid by the government, learning that he had, in common parlance, gotten the 'short end' of the deal, gave ex-pression to his feelings while somewhat under the influence of liquor and skilful questioning and more liquor brought out of the entire story. The story has been known to a number of people for six weeks past. In a very clever manner the conspirators managed to place with the armor plate that had been passed upon and accepted by the naval officers stationed at the works as inspectors, plates that had failed to come up to the hignest pos-sible mark of excellence, but which were 'good, all excelling the low-st limit of tolerance in specification.' The substitution of defective plates extended over a period of time and was done in a systematic manner, the conspirators keeping a careful record of spirators keeping a careful record of every plate substituted.
