ALLEN HOUSE ROBBERIES.
Confronted with Evidence, Fred Rich-
mond Admits Being Guilty.

HONESDALE, March 5.—Fred Rich-
mond, a former porter at the Allen
house, was arrested Saturday, charged
with burglary, and placed in the county
jail. Fred Smith was also arrested
as an accomplice, charged with re-
ceiving stolen goods. He was released
on \$200 bail.

It seems that for some time past the
proprietor and clerks at the Allen
house have been missing money from
the safe, usually in small amounts,
and have been unable to account for its
disappearance up to Friday, Feb. 23.
On that day the clerk, Edward Wood,
left the office for a few moments and
on returning saw Richmond leave the
office and also discovered that money
had been taken from the safe during
his absence. He followed Richmond,
found the money in his possession, and
succeeded in having him admit his
guilt.

Mr. Wood then set about tracing the
movements of Richmond for the past
few months, and found he had been
using considerable money in various
parts of the county.

The evidence thus collected was
brought before Richmond, and he
finally admitted his guilt, but denied
that Smith had anything to do with it.
As the safe stands in plain view to
persons in the hall and reading room,
the boldness of the robbery is surpris-
ing.
