NOVEL POINT IN TARIFF LAW

The United States Supreme Court Will Be Asked to Pass Upon the Meaning of Section Twenty-five in the Tariff Act of 1890, Otherwise Known as the McKinley Bill-Miscellaneous Jottings of Carefully Culled Industrial Intelligence.

Solicitor General Maxwell has asked the United States Supreme court to construe the tariff act of 1890. The court of appeals of the Ninth circuit had given judgment in a case in favor of Charles R. Allen for \$87.24 moneys alleged to be due as drawback on imported bituminous coal, used on a ves sel engaged in the coastwise trade of the United States. It was contended on behalf of the plaintiff that the right to drawback was preserved by Section 25 of the Tariff Act of 1890, while the United States contended that the acts of 1883 and 1886, under which the plaintiff claimed drawbacks were repealed by Section 55 of the tariff act of 1890. "The question," said Mr. Maxwell, "18 one of very great financial importance to the United States, involving, if the judgment of the circuit court of appeals is correct, the refunding of large amounts of money heretofore regarded as the unquestioned property of the

Information from a prominent offi-cial of the H C. Frick Coke company is to the effect that within two weeks nearly every coke oven in the Connellsville region will be fired up. The move will cover at least ninety per cent, of all the ovens in the region, more than have been in operation at any time for three years past. At the very lowest estimate 6,000 men will be given employment, men who are idle now. The Hungarian and foreign element generally in the region, it appears, was 1,103 55 hundreds have left within the past few months for their foreign homes. This fact will tend largely to the employment of American workmen at the works.
