A PLEASANT WEDDING. William J. Frost and Miss Anna Nelson United at Moosic. Special to the Scranton Tribune.

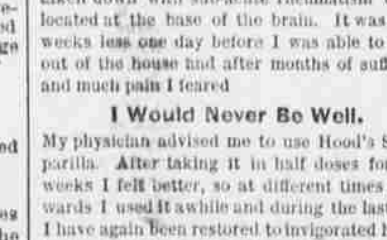
