### DEATH IN THE FLAMES

John Mangan, Aged 11 Years, Rossted to Death in a Burning Building.

The house of Michael Ford in Inkerman was totally destroyed by fire Sat-urday at midnight. At the time of the fire there were in the house Mr. and Mrs. Ford, John Ford, their son, and John Mangan, a grandson. The escape from the burning building by jumping from a window. Mrs Ford in trying to escape became suffocated by the smoke and would have perished in the fiame but for several men who forced in the window such and enveloping her in blankets carried her out nto the open air. She was found to be badly burned and was with much dfficulty resuscitated.

When the flames were at their height it was discovered that young Mangan was missing, and the conclusion that he was in the building became general when the spectators heard above the erackling of the timbers his pitiful pleadings to save his life. When the ruins had sufficiently cooled to permit a search being made his scarred and charred remains were found among the debris.


