MILK DEALERS COMBINE

Say It Will Facilitate the Transaction of Business and Save Money. THE GROCER WILL BE SHUT OUT

Dairymen Do Not Propose to Be Undersold by the Men to Whom They Wholesale Milk—Mr. Stone Explains the Objects in View When Consolidation Was Made—What a Large Dealer Says.

A story has been current of late that the combining of a number of Scranton milk dealers into the new Scranton Dairy company was for the purpose of maintaining a higher price on milk and driving minor competitors from the field.

An investigation has been made by THE TRIBUNE, and from the information received from officials of the Scranton Dairy company and individual dealers of extensive business, it cannot be learned that the so-called combination will, or can, make fictitious prices; at least, such a state of affairs will not appear as long as the dealers now out of the amalgamation maintain their individual businesses.

A COMBINATION FORMED. The union of five of the large milk dealers of the city was consummated March 1, with stock to the amount of \$32,000 held by several members in amounts proportionate to the extent of capital investments in their old business and equipments.

COULD DO BUSINESS CHEAPER. "We found that we could avoid confusion and gather the milk product much cheaper by having it done for us and shipped to a common point. Another consideration is the reduction in handling and delivering expense here in Scranton.

WHOLESALE PRICE TO BE RAISED. He substantiated the statement of Mr. Stone, but stated in addition that the wholesale dispensers of the lactical fluid, hotels, restaurants, etc., would have to pay more than formerly.
