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GENERAL NEWS OF INDUSTRIES

All Anthracite Mine Inspectors Must Meet the Specific Legal Requirement. NINETY PER CENT. IS EXPECTED

New Trolley Developments Showing the Increasing Tendency of Capital to Invest in Electric Traction Securities—Statistics of Anthracite Production for February—Interesting Figures as to the World's Coal Output—Minor Siftings.

A special dispatch from Harrisburg says: At the request of the governor, Deputy Attorney General Stranahan has decided an important question raised by the board of examiners, whose duty it is to pass on the competency of candidates for inspector in the anthracite mines, regarding the examination. He is sworn to a faithful performance of their duties, and after four of them shall have agreed in their recommendation of one candidate to the governor, who has answered 93 per cent of the questions submitted by the board as required by the act of 1891, the governor shall appoint such persons and issue a commission to him for five years. It is the case decided by the deputy district general the board unanimously recommended the appointment of John Maguire, of Tremont, Schuylkill county, for mine inspector of the Eighth district, although a few persons and some of its reports shows by implication that not one of the applicants passed the legal requirement, the governor is informed that he has no right to commission John Maguire and advised that the board contains the examination until the applicant does attain to the required degree of efficiency.

Coal tonnage of the Reading for the week ended March 17 was 211,700 tons, against 210,100 for the corresponding week last year, a decrease of 87,400 tons; for the year to date, 3,353,113 tons, against 3,701,114 for the same period last year, a decrease of 448,000 tons.

Another victory for electric transit is outlined in the Boston special which says that a \$12,000,000 street railway contract for the building and equipping of an electric road about 100 miles long in Boston has just been manufactured in the effort of William A. Boland, of Boston, and every dollar has been secured to accomplish the project. It is the Nashua Electric Road company, of which P. H. Flynn, of New York, is president. The contract with the Johnson Rail company of Johnston, the same company that recently effected the deal for the Alton and Boston, to build the road and turn it over to the company when completed. Simultaneously comes word of the purchase by a northern syndicate, for \$4,000,000, of the consolidation under one management of all the street railway lines of New Orleans. The plan of the syndicate is to build and own the electric lines, and the whole of the electric business must take high rank among the common noises of contemporary industry.
