Messra Kearney, Knowles and Maloney were appointed as a street committee for the present year. A. A. Boyden, on behalf of the property holders of that portion of Main street whose buildings fringe on the west of Main street, asked the council to make an alley at the rear of their pro-perties, the northerly outlet to be on Water street, between Town hall and the Niagara Engine house, and the southerly exit to be on Dock street. On motion the matter was referred to the street committee for action.

J. J. Kennedy, Anthony Clifford and James Hennigan were appointed a light and water committee with power

The bond of John Rielly for the repairing of town hall was received and ordered placed on file.

The policies and renewal of insurance on borough property, presented by James Walsh, were referred to the finance committee. Councilman Kearney took occasion to call the attention of the council to the acin sinking a shaft in the vicinity of the Junction without the necessary permit. 

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
