

SYRACUSE TURN-DOWN

Seranton Defeated Jay Faatz's Men in an Interesting Game.

HOGAN'S SENSATIONAL CATCH

It Probably Saved the Game for Seranton—Home Team Played an Errorless Game—Faatz and Wilson, of the Visitors, Disgust the Spectators by Their Kicking—Hodson Did Some Remarkably Good Work.

What a game it was! Full of life and vim from the opening inning until Hogan made his wonderful catch in the ninth. He was the hero of the hour. The cranks would have denied him nothing in that proud moment when he neatly nipped the fast budding hopes of Syracuse.

But Hogan is modest and he simply returned to his station as if nothing unusual had happened. When the Syracuse club made its appearance on the Providence Road grounds Saturday to contest with the home team, it was the general opinion of the 1,300 persons present that Seranton would have to do some pretty playing to win.

The Syracuse men looked like ball players and handled themselves like ball players. The home team was equal to the emergency, however.

It opened the game by securing four runs in the first inning and after that there was a feeling of certainty that they would win. These runs had the effect of spoiling the temper of Mr. Jay Faatz who covers first base for the Syracuse and also acts as captain.

These four runs made Jay feel uncomfortably hot about the collar. Like the gentlemanly player that he is, he began to kick against Umpire Ketrick's decisions and was not in the least particular either about the character of the language he used.

He kicked, kicked, kicked, and when he tired, Catcher Wilson undertook that portion of the work, winding up by insinuating that he could wipe the diamond with Mr. Ketrick if the conditions for the performance of such a feat were favorable.

They were not and he continued to play ball. In justice to Mr. Ketrick it is but fair to say that his umpiring was very impartial and only in one instance did the Syracuse players get wild against him to the point of a declaration. That was when Eagen was declared out at second. Among the spectators who watched the play, critically there was a difference of opinion as to the justice of that decision.

AN ERRORLESS GAME. The official score of the game shows that Seranton did not make an error. The nearest approach to one was when Stultz let a ball go by him in left field.

At the beginning of the eighth inning Seranton had a lead of three runs. The side was up in one, three, three order and then Syracuse came in and struck a batting streak. Hanrahan opened with a two-bagger and Minnahan sacrificed. Faatz pushed the ball through the atmosphere for a single and Hanrahan scored. Welsh walked to first on balls and Faatz home drive into the field to beat the runner.

This is the point where the enthusiasts began to manifest excitement. Wilson sent a line hit to Westlake, who attempted to throw Welsh out at the plate. Curt is a fiery youth and when he saw the ball sailing towards the plate, began to retrace his steps to third. Patchen leaped after him and both went to the ground. Westlake assisted Patchen to his feet and the ball went to second, where Heas was caught. That double play retired the side and Seranton was saved.

HOGAN'S GREAT CATCH. In the ninth on hits by Stultz, Patchen and Hogan two runs were scored. Syracuse again came in for a turn at the willow. Smith made a single and Callahan struck out. Hanrahan followed with a long drive between corner and left field. It was good for at least two bases if not tripled, and no one expected that it would be. Fleet-footed Hogan saw it coming and started for it at the top of his speed. He caught it with outstretched hands while running, making one of the most sensational catches ever seen on the grounds. He returned the ball so quickly to the pitcher that Smith was unable to advance on the hit. Minnahan, the next batter, was retired by Massey and a victory secured.

Hodson, the new pitcher, was in the box for Seranton and did good work. He struck out five men and gave four bases on balls. He proved to be very handy with the stick. It was one of the best games seen in the city for a long time. The score:
