THINGS OBSERVED AND NOTED. The recent decision of Justice Williams of the supreme court in a case from Schuylkill county, that a member of a school board is ineligible to the office of treasurer of the board because they are incompatible offices, has aroused much interest here, where it has always been the custom to elect as treasurer a member of the board.

In consequence of the re-districting of the borough it appears that the old law requiring the election of justices of the peace for three divisions of the borough composed of the first and second, third and fourth and fifth and sixth wards respectively, has been superannuated. It is not necessary, therefore, that at elections for justices of the peace the vote be cast in the entire borough and not by the separate districts composed of two districts, as heretofore. Hence the election of Justice Jordan and Lyons this spring, when some only of the wards and not all voted on the question, is held to be void and the governor declines to issue their commissions. It is very probable that the governor will make an appointment in each case to hold office until the next annual election.
