Great Dam at Cincinnati in the Ice Age. The country in the vicinity of Cincinnati owes its unsurpassed beauty to the operations of nature during the glacial era. It was the ice movements that gave it those fine terraces along the valleys and graceful contours of formation on the summits of the hills that were so attractive to the pioneers. Here it was that the greatice movement from the north ended. As has been remarked, "Those were the days of the beautiful lake rather than the beautiful river."

No single cause has done more to diversify the surface of the country, to add to the attractiveness of the scenery and to fur-nish the key by which the condition of the ice age can be reproduced to the mind's eye than glacial dama. To them we owe the present existence of nearly all the waterfalls in North America, as well as nearly all the lakes.

A glacial dam across the Ohlo river is supposed to have existed at the site of Cincinnati during the ice age, and the evidence supporting the theory is so full and conclusive that its existence can almost be essumed as an absolute certainty.

The evidences of the former existence of this dam and the lake caused thereby were first discovered and the attention of the scientific world attracted thereto in the summer of 1882 by Professor G. Frederick Wright, of Oberlin.-Howe's Historical Collections of Ohio.

The bell seen on a cow's neck looks like a very ordinary article, but in reality it is different from any other kind of bell in use, and is made especially for the purpose. There are several thousands sold annually in this country, and 90 per cent., if not more of them, are made in Collinsville, where the industry has assumed quite important proportions, shipments of cow bells going to Mexico and Canada, and even much more distant points.

The demand from western ranches used to be very large, and it is still heavy, for not only is there a bell carrier or two in most herds, but there is almost always a reliable slow going old mare in a horse or mule herd, her location being indicated at an immense distance by the bell, and the presence of the younger animals around her being assured.

The cow bell has a covering of copper, and used to be quite an expensive article but of late years improvements in machinery and reduced cost of material have brought the price down to about a fourth of the old standard. There is little sale in large towns now to what there used to be before stock laws were so rigidly enforced. -Interview in St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
