POTTSVILLE WAS VERY EASY.

Scranton had no trouble in defeating the Schuykill boys.

Phenomenal Smith's man had a very narrow escape from being shut out by Scranton yesterday. Hodson was in the box for the home team and pitched in splendid form. He struck out ten men and the four hits that the visitors secured were widely separated.

Up to the beginning of the ninth inning the visitors had only succeeded in getting one player as far as third. That was gabby Mr. Nye who accomplished that feat in the first inning.

In the ninth when the crowd had begun to disperse, confident that Pottsville would be shut out, Golden, who had distinguished himself by striking out during the previous three times at bat, succeeded in making a scratch hit that enabled him by virtue of a close decision to reach first. Potts followed with a short drive to Hodson and Golden was retired at second.

HOW THE RUN WAS SCORED.
Tighe was made a present of a base by Patcher Hodson, and Diggins followed with a hit on which Captain Potts scored the only run that the visitors secured. Foulkrod struck out and Diggins was retired at second on Hill's hit.

Pitcher Fox was a very easy mark for the Scranton slugger in the first and fifth innings. During the remainder of the game he pitched a very good article of ball. A total of twelve hits was made off of him. Aside from his erratic pitching he made two wild throws to bases, one of which allowed two Scranton players to score.

WON IN THE FIRST.
Hogan, the first batter, was retired at first, Wetzel next making a hit that netted one base. Patcher followed with a drive into right that Fielder Hill allowed to pass at express train speed.

Massey struck out and then Wetzel took a turn at the willow. He was given a base on balls. When General Higgins went to the plate the bases were filled, and the cranks prayed for a home run. It did not come but a beautiful single did, that brought Rogers and Staltz home. Westlake was retired at the plate and the home team went into the field with four runs to its credit.

NYE WAS THE FRAT OF THE VISITING PLAYERS to face Pitcher Hodson. He made a hit and stole second. Golden struck out and on Potts' sacrifice Nye was advanced to third. John Tighe was the next batter and was greeted by a heavy round of applause. His reception apparently unnerved him for he struck out.

MORE TROUBLE IN THE FIFTH.
In the second Hogan was given a base on balls, stole second and went to third on a wild throw and scored on Wetzel's sacrifice. In the third and fourth the home team failed to score, but in the fifth Hogan opened with a single and scored on Wetzel's two-base hit. Patcher made a short hit, which Pitcher Fox threw wild to first, allowing Wetzel and Patcher to score. Staltz made a hit for three bases and scored on Massey's sacrifice.

The sixth inning was unproductive of runs for the home team, and in the seventh with bases filled and two men out, Hodson went to the bat and struck out, and the anticipated runs did not materialize. During the remainder of the game Pitcher Fox did such effective work that Scranton was unable to add to its score. Details of the struggle:

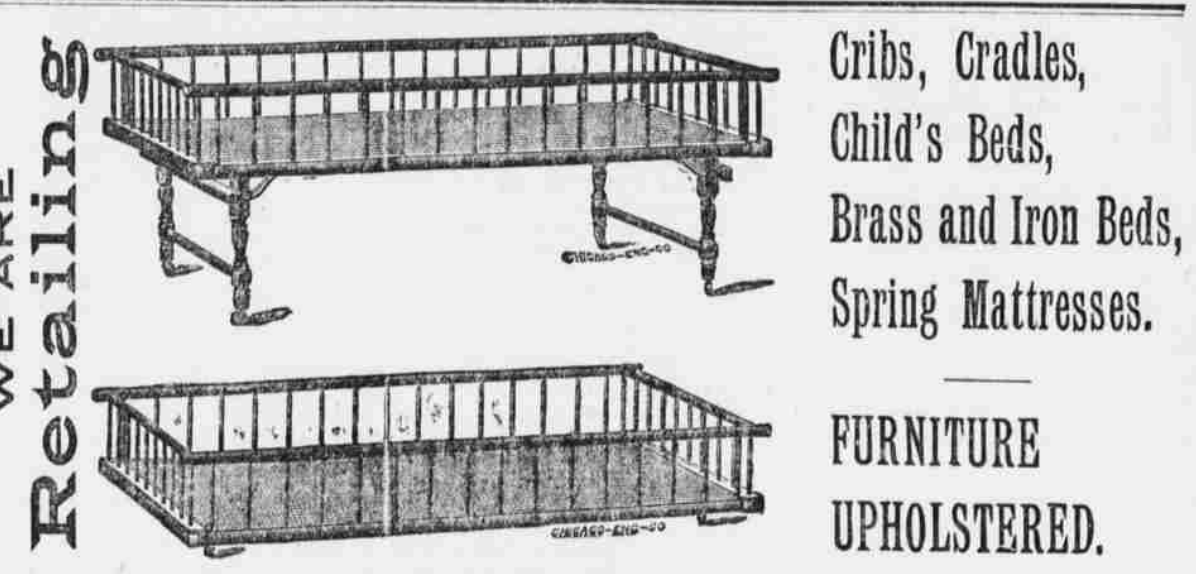
