In fact she was at a loss to explain his absence as he has not been known to miss a day's work in years.

He left home about 6 o'clock on Saturday morning, stating he was going to Syracuse. Last evening Mr. Davis boomed up cheerfully. His excuse for his absence was that he had met a few old friends. He was unrepentant of the great excitement he had created and was greatly surprised when he became aware of the fact. His son, Harry Davis, is now at Syracuse searching for his father.

Pretty Wedding at the Simpson M. E. Church Yesterday.

The sanctuary of the Simpson Methodist Episcopal church was crowded to its capacity last evening for the wedding of Robert J. Williams, of Chestnut street, to Miss Helen B.
