SCRANTON LEADS STATE LEAGUE

Allentown's Defeat by Reading Breaks the Long-Continued Tie Between Us and King Kelly-The Phillies Win Another Game-Harrisburg Loses to Hazleton-Standing of the Clubs. National and Eastern League Results-Timely Base Ball Gossip.

FTER being tied with Allentown for first place since Thursday, July 19, the spell was broken Saturday and Allentown dropped a game to Reading, allowing Scranton to hold undisputed possession of that first place it has for years covered.

Scranton's fourteenth consecutive victory was won from Lancaster, without much ball playing, but the result would have been just the same had not Mr. Donoughe summarily ended the contest by constituting himself an authority above the umpire and refused to accept his decisions.

All of the games won by Scranton since it return home have been taken with comparative ease. If the club was fielding loosely it batted with a terrific force that would have dismayed any pitcher. In fact the Scranton batsmen are now the nightmares that haunt the dreams of the State league pitchers and make them pale and nerveless.

Hodson and Flanaghan have continued their good work with the sphere, and young Yerkes in three of the four games he has pitched showed splendid form. The new pitcher, Woods, of Canada, will go in the box tomorrow.

Never before was greater interest manifested in base ball in this city than at present. The games between Scranton and Allentown during the past week were watched with the liveliest interest and when the announcement was made Saturday night that Allentown had been defeated there was much rejoicing.

Therefore, Corcoran quoted the rules to him without avail, and finally, becoming disgusted at Donoghue's obstinacy, gave him one minute to get out in the field and resume play, declaring that if he did not do so he would give the game to Seranton. Then the Scranton and Lancaster players besought Donoghue to proceed with the game and not disappoint the 1,500 spectators. It was all in vain.

Then the spectators began to demand their money and some even threatened violence if it was not refunded. About forty were hustled outside the grounds and given tickets for future games and the others remained and witnessed the game, which after twenty minutes wrangling was carranged with the manager of the Lancaster club. It was announced by Umpire Corcoran as a "postponed" game, but as there has been no postponed game this season it will probably go down in history as an exhibition game.


