The mantle of idleness overpreads the steel mills and the small army of idle men are at a loss to know where to turn for employment. The mines are next door to being idle, and the only recourse left seems to be this, leaving town and seeking employment elsewhere.

Movings are a familiar sight on the streets of families leaving for other points. The cheerless outlook of a resumption of work necessitates this, or else many cases of hunger and privation would be chronic. The new street railway that is now beginning on Hickory street has given employment to over 100 men, but that number is not a consequence compared to the crowds thrown out of work. The mills will probably be closed until after election, the result of which will decide whether there is to be any more tariff smashing. An official of the Lackawanna Iron and Steel company informed a Tribune reporter that the price of steel rails is at present so low that their manufacture has been carried on for a big period recently at a
