Having finished its work the grand jury was yesterday afternoon at 2.30 discharged by Judge Edwards. What remained of cases not reported before were presented to court yesterday and filed in the clerk of the courts office.

The batch of ignored bills breaks the record for a light term like the one past. Among the indictments are two for murder, one against Francis Bezek for the murder of his sweetheart at Olyphant six weeks ago, and the other against Joseph Reminisky for the Sunday morning murder a short time before that at the "Ridge" near Archbald.
