He had resided in Scranton since boyhood and was 79 years old at the time of his death. The funeral will be held in Tunkhannock.

REV. MR. HOGAN REPLIES.

Editor of The Tribune. Sir: Your comments on my communication in Saturday's Tribune do me great injustice. First--I do not ask old party preachers to vote the third party ticket, but I do demand that, in view of their own church declarations, they shall stop voting saloon license tickets. If such preachers do not like the Prohibition party, let them show us a better one. It is the rankest hypocrisy, imbecility or ignorance to vote with a saloon license party and at the same time denigrate to be in favor of Prohibition.

Second--He 'reads the riot act' to every preacher who does not agree with Mr. Hogan's politics. In that statement you seek to give the impression or assume that the position taken in my former letter is peculiar to me--that it is merely an individual opinion. But there is nothing in my communication, I refer you to the fact that all the great denominations have declared, "That no political party ought to receive the support of Christian men so long as it stands committed to the license policy, or refuses to put itself on record in an attitude of open hostility to the saloon."

Third--The reason I, as a Methodist preacher, "use the pulpit and the cloth" in this holy agitation is because the Methodist church is a Prohibition church by her declarations she belongs to us; and I challenge bishop, preacher or politician to interfere with my "use of the cloth" in the interest of this cause. Fourth--As to the strength of our vote, the matter of a few votes more or less does not concern the true Prohibitionist at this time. He works and votes for principle, and his vote is never lost. A Slight Difference of Opinion.

Editor of The Tribune. Sir:--I am from Dr. Suresh: "Now the relation that typhoid-malaria bears to typhoid fever is about the same as that of a white man blackened bears to a true negro. You can no more get (a) typhoid fever from a malaria germ than you can get a timely stock from a clover seed, because each germ is distinct in itself and gives rise to a fever peculiar to itself."--Dr. Suresh. I quote from Professor Austin Flint: "If simple remittent fever be protracted, certain symptoms denoting the typhoid state may appear--namely low delirium--sordes, subsultus tendinum, etc. These symptoms are not sufficient to show the union of typhoid fever and remittent fever--they are liable to occur in all fevers, and in various other affections. In typhoid-malarial fever the symptoms distinctive of typhoid fever are intermingled with those of periodical fever. The symptoms referred to are those connected with the abdominal lesions of typhoid fever; namely: diarrhoea, tympanites and illia tendens. The characteristic eruption, even of typhoid fever, is sometimes observed. Typhoid-malarial fever is caused by the combined action of malaria and the special cause of typhoid fever. Practitioners in malarious situations have been accustomed to say that remittent fevers exported in typhoid fever--this mode of expression is not accurate; there is not a metamorphosis of the one disease into the other, but a combination of both diseases, the phenomena of the one or of the other disease predominating in different cases."

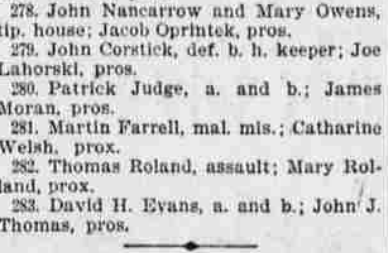
