Blacksmith Shop at Stafford Colliery Destroyed Yesterday by Fire.

PRESUMED TO BE INCENDIARY

The Shop Had Not Been Used for More Than Six Months—Owned by William Connell & Co.—Heptasoph Elect Officers for Coming Year.

Fire consumed the building used as a blacksmith shop at the Stafford colliery owned by William Connell & Co. yesterday afternoon. The Stafford colliery has not been operated in a number of months. The buildings on the surface, the engine house and the blacksmith shop, are newly built, and the loss of the latter by fire will amount to perhaps \$1,000.

The supposition is that either a spark from a passing Delaware and Hudson train caused the blaze, or else it was deliberate arson. In the absence of water plugs the fire had nothing to stop it when it became started.
