At the meeting of the sales agents in December they agreed that the output for January should not be more than 2,300,000 tons. These figures have been already largely exceeded, shipments for the first twenty six days of the month having aggregate 2,522,564 tons, or an average of 97,021 ton per day, equal to an output for the month of 2,07,651 tons. In the early part of the month it appeared as though the output agreed upon would not be exceeded, but in the second week the percentage was largely increased, and since then it has grown steadily. Shipments for the week ended Jan. 26 were 686,599 tons, an increase compared with the same week of 1894 of 158,855 tons. Prior to this week there had been a decrease compared with last year but last week's increase resulted in mak ing an increase for the year to the dat named of 144,931 tons, totals being 2,522,554 tons for twenty-six days last month, against 2,377,633 tons for the corresponding period in 1894.

The defeat of the Rellly bill in the house on Saturday led to selling for both home and foreign account and as a result prices fell ½ to 2 per cent. In the first hour. 


